## Twenty Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time A Scriptural Reflection

### Power Struggles

Do you resist paying taxes or obeying authorities? Do you always disagree with a particular person at work or in your household? Do you need people to do as you say? Are you afraid of making decisions? Of saying “no”? If so, you are engaged in struggles over your own and others’ power in your life. This week’s scriptures provide a way of resolving many of those struggles without taking sides.

The readings leave little doubt as to who holds the real power in the world. It is “the LORD, and there is no other” (Isaiah 45:6) who anoints Cyrus and grasps him by the right hand (the hand of power), making him victorious and giving the Israelites their freedom. The psalm tells us to give glory and honor to the Lord, who is “beyond all gods” and “governs the peoples with equity” (Psalm 96:4, 10). Paul gives thanks to God, whose power is at work in the gospel Paul preached and in the Thessalonians themselves. Finally, in Jesus’ power struggle with the Pharisees, he says, “Repay . . . to God what belongs to God” (Matthew 22:21). God is the power above all human powers—in government, business, the Church, and our own families. We owe God all “glory and honor” (Psalm 96:7), thanks, loyalty, and our lives.

### Power Within

We are to give praise and pay tribute to God as the one and only source of true power in our lives. When we do, our ordinary power struggles can more easily be resolved. Like the Thessalonians, we discover the power within ourselves. The Holy Spirit empowers us to live in faith, hope, and love. We no longer feel we must dominate others. We are compelled neither to resist those who have power over us nor always to give in to them. We stop fearing our own power. God’s power within us and over all human powers gives us confidence, courage, and humility in every power struggle we may encounter.

**PASTOR'S MESSAGE**

Dear Parishioners:

This weekend we celebrate World Mission Sunday. Pope Pius XI first instituted this celebration in the Church in 1926 and the ninety-four years since have provided us with the opportunity to recall that the missionary work of the Church is not only the responsibility of those serving in missionary countries but is the vocation of all the faithful. In a past message for World Mission Sunday Pope Emeritus Benedict wrote: On the occasion of the World Mission Sunday, I would like to invite you to reflect on the continuing urgency to proclaim the Gospel also in our times. The missionary mandate continues to be an absolute priority for all baptized persons who are called to be "servants and apostles of Christ Jesus" at the beginning of this millennium. My venerable Predecessor, the Servant of God Paul VI, already stated in the Apostolic Exhortation *Evangelii Nuntiandi*: "Evangelizing is in fact the grace and vocation proper to the Church, her deepest identity" (No. 14). As a model of this apostolic commitment, I would like to point to Saint Paul in particular, the Apostle of the nations, because this year we are celebrating a special jubilee dedicated to him. It is the Pauline Year which offers us the opportunity to become familiar with this famous Apostle who received the vocation to proclaim the Gospel to the Gentiles, according to what the Lord had announced to him: "Go, I shall send you far away to the Gentiles" (Acts 22:21). How can we not take the opportunity that this special jubilee offers to the local Churches, the Christian communities and the individual faithful to propagate the proclamation of the Gospel to the ends of the world, the power of God for the salvation of everyone who believes (Cf. Rm 1:16)?

The month of November is fast approaching and therefore envelopes are available on the counter in the back of the church for those who may wish to enroll a departed loved one in our All Souls Novena of Masses. You may drop your envelope in the basket on Sunday or return it directly to our parish office by October 31<sup>st</sup>. Also, in keeping with our parish tradition we will be posting pictures of loved ones who have passed. If you would like to have a loved one included in these there is a box to receive pictures on the counter in the entrance to the church. Please note that pictures may not be returned so include a copy that can be kept by the parish.

(Pastor's Message continued)

Today, October 18th, is the celebration of the Feast of Saint Luke and so I thought it might be good to refresh our memories about who Luke was and what he wrote. One commentary on the gospels says: "St. Luke was and evangelist and also author of the Acts of the Apostles and commonly identified with the Luke St. Paul mentions in his epistles, one as "my dear friend Luke, the doctor" (Col. 4:14). He was a gentile and is credited with the best Greek in the New Testament. From the "we" passages in the Acts of the Apostles it appears that he joined St. Paul at Troas during the second missionary journey and went along as far as Philippi. Some years later he rejoined the missionary party at Philippi and remained Paul's traveling companion, not only as far as Jerusalem but also on the sea voyage that took Paul as a prisoner to Rome. Though Luke gives the precise year in the reign of Tiberius when John the Baptist began to preach, exact times and places are for the most part missing from his gospel. Under the vague heading of a trip to Jerusalem he weaves together ten chapters of his Gospel out of materials almost wholly omitted by others. He is careful to show Christ praying before every important step, giving eight instances not mentioned by the other evangelists and he preserved the parable of the widow and the unjust judge to inculcate perseverance at prayer. Luke is sensitive and sympathetic to the role of women and shows a sensitivity for minorities and the underprivileged: Samaritans, lepers, publicans, soldiers, public sinners, and the poor. Dante called his the "gospel of Christ's meekness" for only Luke includes the incidents of the sinful woman kissing Christ's feet, of Zacchaeus, of the good thief; only he recounts the parables of the lost coin, the Pharisee and the publican, and the prodigal son. Acts of the Apostles and the gospel bring out the joy of believing and underline the role of the Holy Spirit in the first congregations and in the enduring life of the church." Our celebration this week might be a good opportunity to dust off our bibles and read a little bit from the Gospel of Luke or the Acts of the Apostles.

**Prayer and New Beginnings**

Some of us rise early. Those who do are regularly blessed by the stunning beauty of a fresh sunrise. On those mornings when cloud cover scatters in horizontal bands, the color display is amazing, and we reach for a camera. It's hard not to notice such wonder with genuine awe. What a gift, and what a great way to start the day.

How we start a venture of any kind matters. Beginnings are important. The first few hours of life are critical. A butterfly must be allowed to pierce its cocoon uninterrupted, just as a baby chick must be allowed to crack its shell. To disrupt either process is to stunt the growth of either fragile creature. Merchants frame the first dollar from their initial sale. How that initial customer reacts, how we handle the day's first assignment, how our first exam goes – well, so goes the day.

Beginning a life of prayer, or endeavoring to restructure your prayer life, is like that. How you begin is important. Rest. Be at ease. There's no need for a false sense of obligation. No one is asking that of you, certainly not your Creator. Prayer is a privilege, a conversation with the Creator of the universe. It may sound daunting, but He invites us to share our hearts and to listen to Him.

Do we believe our hearts are hidden from Him? We know better. So, if you feel a bit uncertain, go ahead and say so. Begin there. It's okay. Your loving Heavenly Father already knows what is going on in your heart. It's neither irreverent nor disrespectful to reveal what God already knows. Agreeing with Him is an act of faith.

As far as prayer goes, just beginning is what's most important. Some almost never do. We joke that everyone prays before a test, but how many know the joy of praying about virtually everything? We consider the presence of the One Most Holy, we worship, and we pray. Very simple. "I need you today, Lord. I'd really rather not be going in to the office." "Thank you, Father, for my family. Help me to be a loving Father too." "Lord, give me the grace to love my children." "As a teacher, God, I've run out of ideas. Please help me." "Why is this stuff not working out? It's so unfair."

Begin. Pray. A commitment to a life of prayer, certainly a commitment to pray regularly this year, just like any commitment, must begin somewhere. Begin today. Those questions you have? Direct those thoughts heavenward.
